



OUR RURAL DEAN, THE REVD SARAH DANGERFIELD, WRITES...

I wonder with what you associate the month of September? The start of a new academic year? The resumption of meetings? A seasonal piece of work? A holiday when the school's return? The changing colour of the trees? The beginning of rehearsals for a Christmas concert?

For me, September is a month I look forward to meeting up with the children in school after the summer holidays and meeting new pupils. I look forward to Harvest lunches and suppers (what a benefit to have five or more to go to!) because these are those special times when a village comes together to give thanks for what we have been given,



and to remember and to share with others whose harvest is less than plentiful. I look forward to hearing what the choir has chosen to sing for Advent and Christmas. And yes, September is one of my two favourite months for two of my interests – walking and gardening.

This September such associations are somewhat confused. Things are not going to happen quite in the same way as they have before. All of us are having to think of how to do things in new ways – at work, at school, at home, and in church. We are living with uncertainty. Many are facing money worries. Some of the decisions which were already hard to make, can be harder with the effects of the pandemic. Yet, new opportunities are arising. To build upon the good things we have learnt in recent months. A time to re-think, to re-prioritise, and to look at the bigger issues in our personal lives and the life we share with others.

It is not surprising that so many people say how tired they feel. Thinking through complex stuff is tiring. It can be emotional too. Less surprising is that more people than ever are saying they pray. In this we recognise we do not have the power within ourselves to work things out for good, or the strength to do everything we feel responsible for but God does, and God generously gives when we ask in prayer.

Prayer to me can sometimes feel like bringing to God a knotty mass of threads – and asking God to help me watch Him as He unravels them – not straight away – over time – and asking God to grant me the patience of waiting while He does.

Right now, lots of things can feel even more of a jumble than usual. In so many aspects of life – there are many things to think through afresh – it can feel like a maze of old and new – known and unknown.

Living prayerfully – trusting the moment to God in prayer – asking God to untie the knots to help us to see His ways, for they may not be our ways. Asking God to show us what is important and what is not important.

Paul in his letter to the Romans (8: 26,27) wrote:

"The Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God." Asking God to show us the seeds He has planted. They may be tiny like a mustard seed – but it is God's seed – and if it is Gods and by His grace we work with it, whatever it is in our life – we can trust Him for its growth.

Prayer helps us to see things in ourselves and around us, in a different light. We begin to see and hear with the eyes and ears of God. Living prayerfully helps others to see through us, things in God's light too. What we mean by His glory.





THE GARAGE WHICH BECAME A SHOP IN LOCKDOWN

Wendy Harrison, of Back Lane / Perwell Close, came up with a bright idea of producing an article about an enterprise, based in Back Lane, which has received some attention in recent days and which deserves to be promoted. The idea was warmly received! Wendy writes...

These are indeed strange times, when very little is the same as usual.

One thing which hasn't changed is our custom to mark birthdays and anniversaries - but how do we get hold of cards when we are in lock-down?

In a crisis, **step forward Pam Frith**, Bredon's Back Lane's water-colour artist in residence.

Pam had already established the home production and sale of her cards and pictures by attending local markets and fund-raising events. All of her proceeds go to Umthombo, a charity working with street children in Durban, South Africa.

It is a long way from Bredon to Durban. The link came through Pam's son Daniel and his wife Sarah who worked for a period of time as volunteers for the

Eight years ago, Pam and her husband Christopher visited them in Durban, where they enthusiastically spent time in the Umthombo Centre. So impressed were they by the work done there, and by the success rate in truly setting young people on a worthwhile path in life, that on their return home, plans were made. Painting a huge variety of water-colours, followed by the production of cards and calendars featuring them, some rather *quirky*, others more traditional in style, began in earnest, and Pam's

DEEP MAGIC, DRAGONS & TALKING MICE How reading C S Lewis can change your life

Alister McGrath invites us to imagine a conversation with Lewis in a pub or perhaps as tutorials, where the great questions of life are freely debated. What would Lewis say to someone trying to cope with grief? Or needs help to cope with life's hard knocks? What is the meaning of life?

Lewis believed in 'story' as a medium to convey meaning and understanding. Hence Narnia is created, and the seven novels of the series became the best-known of his works. McGrath tells us they were conceived during the late forties when Lewis' world was falling to pieces, both for his own career and the sad state of England in the aftermath of war.

In the first novel "The Lion the Witch and the Wardrobe" we are

introduced to the land of 'Narnia' which is a parallel world, not of humans, (though they had heard of them) but of all kinds of other beings - some of them able to speak! These were all under the oppressive rule of a 'white witch' and it was always winter there. Into this environment four children are mysteriously inducted (through a wardrobe) and are soon embroiled in the battle. The entry of a redeeming lion called Aslan sees the situation firmly reversed. It was a world in which Lewis skilfully replicates, in principle, the situation of the real world that we inhabit; a warfare between Good and Evil.





SELF ISOLATION IN A RURAL PARISH

After forty years in Bredon, I thought I knew them all ...all the pathways. I had walked every right of way in the parish at least once, but not, as it happened, during the first week of May. 'Shall I compare thee to a summer's day?' gives us the impression that Shakespeare considered summer to be the premier season of the year, and of life. Leaving that aside, having being born several centuries ago, he could never have witnessed that unforgettable scene from the top of the railway embankment in Kinsham.



The familiar wave of the Malverns, Bredon Hill and the Cotswold escarpment were all in their place, while before and below me stretched 800 metres of golden meadowland alongside the Carrant Brook. Never had I walked here at this particular time of year. In winter it had been flooded with muddied water yet, in this week of May, it was transformed into a sunlit carpet of countless millions of buttercups: the goldfields of Kinsham.

This was not my only discovery. Thanks to dog-walking friends, I learned of a pathway with curlews in the early spring, yellow water lilies later on along the river bank, and of a timeless scene above the Avon of the beckoning spire of St Giles, silhouetted on its promontory.

Still, we really cannot blame Shakespeare, for 'Shall I compare thee to a *springtime* day?' doesn't quite cut the mustard, and certainly not ours in Tewkesbury. Even so, when the time comes to cast our mind back over the year, the month of May might turn out to have been more like summer than summer itself.

Meanwhile, in the latter half of June, the linseed fields of Lower Westmancote are turning themselves sky -blue, reminding me of the final work of John Moore's trilogy: The Blue Field. If only the oak tree, planted in his memory in the same village over half a century ago, were not looking so neglected. Sparked off by the repeat of Jane Austen's Pride and Prejudice on BBC 4, I actually began to read and appreciate the sense of Elinor, the sensibility of Marianne, the steadfast faithfulness of Captain Wentworth and the folly of Emma. At long last, P and P is off the shelf and, if it had not been for the lockdown, when would I *ever* have found the time?

If Jane Austen is now really being read, Monty Don's 'Gardeners' World' is being watched *and* listened to. With pencil and paper in hand, I have noted down this and that recommendation. Purple dead nettles are already in growth. Astrantias are planted, giving star-like flowers until the end of October, and the plant of the century, winner of the Chelsea Flower Show, 2013: Rozanne, the blue geranium is beginning to flower, pleasantly complementing the whites and pinks. Now, all that is needed is to await the group of newly arrived Nandinas, known as 'Firepower', to live up to their name in the



For those of us fortunate enough to be surviving lockdown and self-isolation, thanks, let it be said, to the support of others, there *are* some real positives, and, as my mother would gently remind us during the long years of rationing, 'we must count our blessings.'

SYLVIA HARRINGTON'S RECIPE FOR SEPTEMBER

Raspberry Meringues with Elderflower Cream -serves 4

For the meringues 4 egg whites

autumn.

- 225grm caster sugar
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon cornflour
- 1 teaspoon vanilla essence]
- 2 x 125grms punnets raspberries



For the Elderflower Cream 170grms mascapone 2 tablespoons icing sugar 2 tablespoons elderflower cordial



Preheat oven 110c gas 1/2 line 2 baking sheets with baking parchment

- Whisk the egg whites with a pinch of salt until stiff.
- Gradually add the sugar whisking until you can stand a spoon in the mixture.
- Add the lemon juice, cornflour and vanilla extract and fold in the raspberries.
- Place heaped tablespoons of mixture on the prepared baking trays.
- Bake in oven for about 1hr 30 mins or until crisp and dry to the touch and they lift off the paper easily.
- Meanwhile mix together the mascapone, icing sugar and elderflower cordial. Chill until needed .
- To serve sandwich together two raspberry meringues with a spoonful of the elderflower cream.
- Dust with icing sugar
- Repeated from July in case you missed it

Footways

There has been a lot of feedback regarding the footways in and around Bredon, especially as during lockdown everyone was using them more.

We've spoken to our County Councillor, Adrian Hardman, who is our direct contact with Worcestershire County Council who have responsibility for most footways, though not all. The feedback had some interesting facts that we thought would be good to share with our parishioners.

The County Council has a limited budget to spend, spread across many villages and towns. There is a priority when it comes to footway spending, which when explained makes logical sense.

County is rolling out a programme to upgrade footways with an emphasis on usage, hence footways close to local services - church, shops, pubs, and areas with a higher density of houses are prioritised. This explains why Church Street, the Main Road and Blenheim Drive are more often maintained. Rural Interconnector footways, like the ones to Westmancote and Kinsham, have a lower priority.

Other footways e.g. Queensmead don't fall under the remit of County Council or the Parish Council which adds to the confusion.


Ken Brown's Obituary

The Parish Council would like to recognise the good work that Ken did for our community while he served on the Parish Council. Most significantly was the purchase in 2010 of the Playing Field Site and the associated buildings and facilities e.g. the Village Hall and the Sports Club facilities. Prior to this, the Parish Council had leased all these facilities from the Hancock's trust. The money for the purchase was borrowed from the District Council and was co-incidentally repaid in full earlier this year.

There were many more projects and decisions Ken was involved in, but far too many to mention here. But what a legacy to leave our community.

Sylvia Harrington's Recipe No 2

Damson and Almond Cobbler

Serves 6

1kg damsons washed and destalked 85 g white sugar 85grm light muscavado sugar plus 1 tablespn 115grm plain flour 100grm ground almonds 3 level tspn baking powder 1 pinch of fine salt 85grms cold unsalted butter roughly chopped 6fl oz buttermilk or full cream milk with 1teaspn lemon juice 2-3drops almond essence or extract 15grms flaked almonds

1-2 litre ovenproof dish

oven 200c gas7

Gently simmer damsons for a few minutes with the white and brown sugars ---taste --you may need more according to your taste and place in dish.

Combine the flour ground almonds baking powder and salt in a food processor and whizz for a few seconds and add the butter and whizz again until mixture looks like breadcrumbs.

Pour in the buttermilk or the milk and lemon juice and the almond essence. Process again until the mixture forms a claggy mass. Remove the blades and scrape the mixture on them into the bowl.

Using your fingers and a spoon dollop tangerine sized heaps on top of the damsons --there should be enough to do eight little cobbles. Finish with scattering the flaked almonds over the top and the remaining tablespoon of muscavado sugar.

Place the dish on the middle shelf in the oven and cook for 20-30 mins until the cobbles have risen and a lovely golden brown and the damsons are bubbling.

Remove from oven and leave to cool for about 10 mins and serve with thick cream or creme fraiche or custard.






